Recess play offers children the opportunity to be physically active, which is not only beneficial for their physical health but also their mental health. This Secondary 3 boy was in such a hurry that he forgot to put on his shoes. He ran - not away from danger, but from door to door to warn his neighbours to get out. Though he was well aware of the risks of inhaling smoke, his only thought was to make sure nobody, especially the seniors he knew in the floors above and below, was hurt. Many were still fast asleep at 6.30am on Friday (13 May). Speaking to The Straits Times, Ping Peng said, "My mother kept knocking on the door of the old lady next door until she opened."



"Then I remembered there were neighbours upstairs and downstairs, so I kept running."

Recalling how he half-crawled and half-ran through the thick smoke that had enveloped many floors in the block, Ping Peng said he felt a sharp pain in his nostrils the longer he remained in the building. He said, "I used to think, when you watch movies, it's choking. But in real life, it was like inhaling pain. Every time I breathed in, it got worse and worse."

Although Ping Peng could not remember how many doors he banged on to warn his neighbours, he covered all the floors from the fifth to the 11th. The older of two sons said, "I knew I needed to be fast. I didn't want anyone to be injured. Time was precious."

P6 PROJECT MOTIVATION

The P6 Project Motivation, helmed by the PE Department, was carried out on 23 and 24 March 2022.

The objectives of the programme were as follows:



To inculcate a positive attitude and a Growth Mindset

The full-day programme, based on the ESL Reflection Model (Effort, Support and Learning), is cemented on the belief that one's effort, belief in their own capabilities, and willingness to learn from their mistakes, will enable them to develop into individuals with a Growth Mindset.

To achieve these objectives, students were exposed to a variety of activities. Even though the activities were not easy, the students rose to the challenge and had fun at the same time.

- Laser Tag and Kin-Ball gave students the opportunity to come together and devise strategies to win, as well as encourage and motivate one another when things did not go their way;
- Water Transport tested the students' ability to work together using verbal and non-verbal cues; and
- Tug-of-War tapped on the students' belief in their own ability – not to give up easily and to dig deep into their reserves to overcome all odds.





Students were also inspired by our guest speaker, Mr Jason Leong, who shared how, with determination and resilience, he overcame the challenges in his life.



After each activity, the teachers conducted a debrief to seal their learning as well as to provide them with dedicated time and space to reflect on their individual and collaborative efforts that led to the outcomes of each task.

Form teachers also assisted to identify a learning disposition for each student, which was an area of personal growth for them. As part of their reflections, students then took the opportunity not only to think about how they could improve on the selected learning disposition but also to commit themselves to working on them.

Using the iPad, the students wrote a letter to their future self, and these letters will be printed for them before the PSLE so that they can be encouraged by their own efforts to live up to the growth goals they had set for themselves.





This year, Yumin Primary School took a different approach in commemorating International Friendship Day. While our Yumin Champs had the opportunity to learn more about ASEAN as a whole, they also delved deeper into a selected country of focus, Cambodia, the member state leading ASEAN in 2022.



Students were engaged in a variety of tasks that day – the Primary 1 and 2 students learnt about the flags of the 10 member states and engaged in an activity to colour them correctly. Primary 3 and 4 students unleashed their artistic creativity by designing elements of the **sampot** – a traditional garment in Cambodia, while the Primary 5 and 6 students incorporated a variety of different weaving patterns to create colourful designs.


Class presentation!



As part of experiential learning, the English department organised a virtual integrated outdoor learning journey for Primary 3 students to the Singapore Zoo.

The session, titled **RepTopia** Goes to School, helped students to extend their knowledge about various reptiles and also build on their concept of adaptation. Prior to the learning journey, students were taught elements of non-fiction texts, so that they could appreciate this text form and later create one of their own, on an animal of their choice.

Post-visit, students worked in groups to create the poster, which required them to strategically synthesise information obtained from the learning journey, as well as the research that they had carried out during their English lessons. These culminated in a presentation, to give students a platform to speak confidently in front of their peers and teachers.



The theme for this year's Hari Raya Celebration, held on 5 May 2022, was Gratitude Raya.

To promote the spirit of Hari Raya, all students participated in the design of Hari Raya cards, which they could give to their friends, teachers, or any member of the school staff, to express their appreciation for them. 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To spice up the celebration students also participated in the Guess the Raya Ketupat segment. It was certainly a very meaningful celebration!



It also allows students to explore and look for books from different sources - online reading portals like Scholastic, as well as the school, class, home and public libraries. 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NE-MIN OF FAME

The English Department embarked on '1 Minute of Fame' this year, which takes place during recess on the last week of every month.

The main objective of this activity is to develop our Yumin Champs into confident and effective public speakers by providing them with a platform to share their thoughts and ideas.

For this activity, teachers select students to give a one-minute speech based on their own choice of topics or one on the list provided by their teachers.

Students responded enthusiastically to the activity and many of the presenters even engaged their audience by interacting with and asking them questions!

Students who were not ready to speak in front of a larger audience, were also given the opportunity to have their own one-minute of fame in their class. This enabled all students to have the experience of speaking in front of an audience and in so doing, develop their confidence in public speaking.

RUBIK'S CUBE CHALLENGE

This year, the Rubik's Cube Challenge garnered an overwhelming response of about 90 challengers across the 6 levels. To prepare students for the challenge, the organising team set up practice stations and provided students with online resources to learn how to solve the Rubik's cube.

Our students demonstrated self-directedness and perseverance as they practised tirelessly not only to complete the one/six-side solve but also to beat their own personal best timings. Through friendly sparring sessions and sharing of tips with one another, students encouraged, helped, and motivated their peers to progress.

The Rubik's Cube Challenge was held on 19 May 2022. Students did their best and showed their determination to win. The focus exhibited by even our young P1 cubers was simply amazing! Our fastest Yumin Champion to solve all 6 sides of the cube was **Issac Shi En Lee from P4 Compassion** with the timing of 35.35 seconds while our fastest Yumin Champion to solve 1 side of the cube was **Ethan Ker from P5 Respect** with a neat timing of merely 6.39 seconds!







We look forward to next year's competition and better results as students continue to improve!














P5 SPORTS CARNIVAL

Outdoor Adventure to Sungei Buloh

With the easing of COVID-19 measures and restrictions, our P3 Budding Champs had the opportunity to go on an Outdoor Learning Experience to Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 23 and 24 March 2022.

The objectives of this outdoor hike are:

To provide our students with the opportunity to appreciate nature

e To develop students resilience through outdoor education To enable students to learn fascinating facts about the mangroves

To pick up tips on respecting our environment

Through this hike, students not only gained important knowledge about mangroves, they also developed their love for the outdoors and at the same time, discovered the value of resilience that they had in them. During the learning journey, students were given opportunities to work on their social emotional domains through their interaction with peers and as they practised the acceptable ethics when outdoors. Teachers also capitalised on teachable moments to reinforce how students could assess danger and manage risks in the outdoors. Students were excited to see different types of wildlife such as the monitor lizard, horseshoe crabs, milky storks and mudskippers. Some even had the experience of a lifetime - witnessing a tree snake moulting!



Even though students were tired by the end of the hike, many shared that the outdoor experience had piqued their interest for the outdoors, and they were keen to go back to Sungei Buloh and explore the rest of the mangrove areas with their families!
